PC-226 Spirituality of Pastoral Care and Counseling

Wesley Theological Seminary
July 20 to July 29; Zoom and Blackboard Learning Modules

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Course Description

This course explores the intersection between spirituality and pastoral care and counseling. We will focus on disciplines/practices that foster spiritual awareness and responsive ministry. Participants and the instructor will cooperatively create the intellectual, spiritual, and emotional space for learning and integrating spiritual disciplines into care ministries of the church. The course will follow a "retreat model" of learning with both group interactions and presentations on Zoom, and personal reflective engagement and practice through the Blackboard learning system.

Course Goals

- To increase participants' ability to articulate and understand common characteristics and dynamics of human spiritual life
- To expose participants to a range of spiritual practices, and the pastoral theological and scientific support for these practices
- To increase participants' understanding of, comfort with, and ability to articulate and analyze their own spiritual experience.
- To deepen participants' intellectual and experiential knowledge of spiritual resources available for growth and care, especially in contexts of trauma
- To prepare participants to assist others when they seek help with assessing and responding to needs and problems in their spiritual life.

1) Pre-Class Writing Assignment

- a. Name and discuss two intersections between pastoral caring and contemplative spiritual practices. Draw upon the required assigned readings in your response.
- b. Name and discuss one practice that has sustained you and/or your congregation during this time of twin pandemics with covid-19 and systemic racism. Draw upon the required assigned readings in your response.

2) Post Class Assignment

The final course assignment will be discussed in class. The assignment will be no more than five pages (1500 words) and due by Thursday, August 26 at noon EDT.
