Baptismal Watershed Assignment

HT 567 Theology in Place Ghost Ranch 2022

At Ghost Ranch, one of our Evening Prayer liturgies will include a time to give thanks for baptism and for the gift of water, which nourishes, blesses, and sustains creaturely life. During this liturgy, you will be invited to stand, name, and give thanks for the waters in which you were baptized and for the watershed from which those waters were drawn.

Your assignment is to research and compose a statement describing your "baptismal watershed," which you will read during our liturgy.

Research

In what waters were you baptized? Trace the waters used in your baptism to their source in creation. If you were baptized in a river or lake, this will be simple. If you were baptized in a church font, research where the tap water of that church comes from. What watershed is the water from? Which rivers and glaciers feed that watershed? What natural landforms or geological events shaped the land that forms the watershed?

The following will aid your research. Use the address of the church where you were baptized:

- How's my waterway? https://www.epa.gov/waterdata/hows-my-waterway
- Try googling "what's my watershed address" and the name of your state. States keep their own searchable GIS watershed maps.

Compose

Using the template below, compose your Baptismal Watershed statement in 3-4 sentences. Conclude your statement with the thanksgiving: "I give thanks for the waters of my baptism."

Template

I was baptized into the Body of Christ at (name of church or community) in (place name) in water from (name of local river, lakes, streams — the local sources of drinking water pulled from the tap to fill the font). These waters were drawn from the (name of watershed), which is formed by the (landforms and geological events that shape(d) this watershed). I give thanks for the waters of my baptism.

You may adjust the template as needed to fit the story of your baptismal waters. Feel free to add anything else interesting that you discover about your baptismal watershed, keeping your statement to 2-4 sentences. See Dr. Duba's **Model** on reverse.
